

## Statement of International Federation of Medical Students' Associations (IFMSA) 68th WHO RC for Europe, Rome, Italy 17-20 September 2018

## Countries at the centre: the strategic role of country offices in the WHO **European Region**

We, the IFMSA, applaud the efforts of WHO in preparation of this report and showing high interest to the work of country offices. We believe that maintaining similar visits in the future will result in a better understanding of internal challenges and resources in the countries, empower country offices in their work and encourage WHO and Member States to prepare a collaboration plan that reflects on their specific situation.

Adoption of the General Program of Work had been the first step in bringing changes to the communities, and the whole process requires tremendous work at the grass roots. The presence of WHO in the countries is playing significant role in initiating actions and tailoring to country's needs.

The report showed how many goals the WHO country offices, governments and NGOs have in common when advocating for good health and wellbeing. Partnerships make the work more cost-effective, aims achievable and outcomes impactful.
