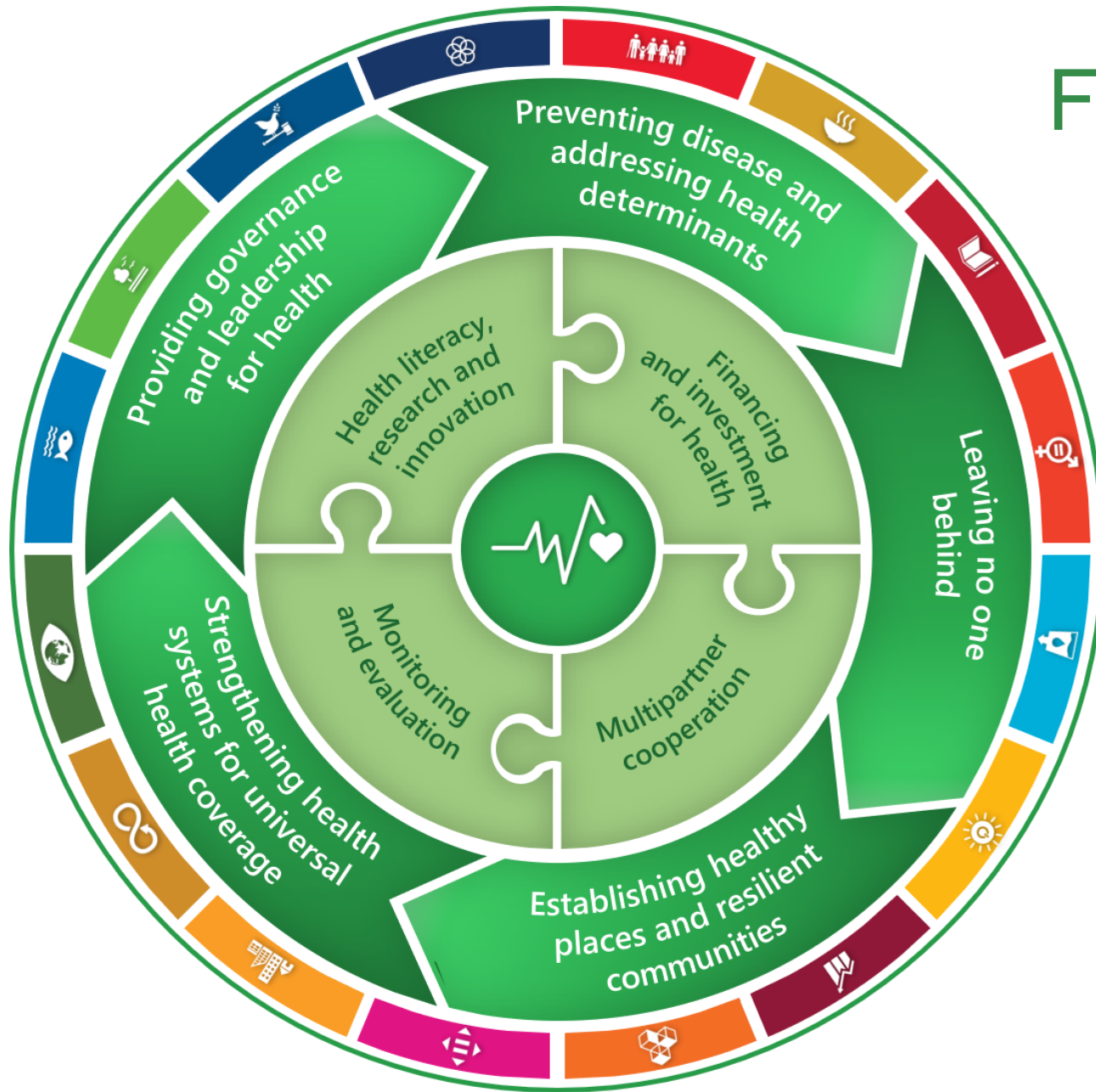

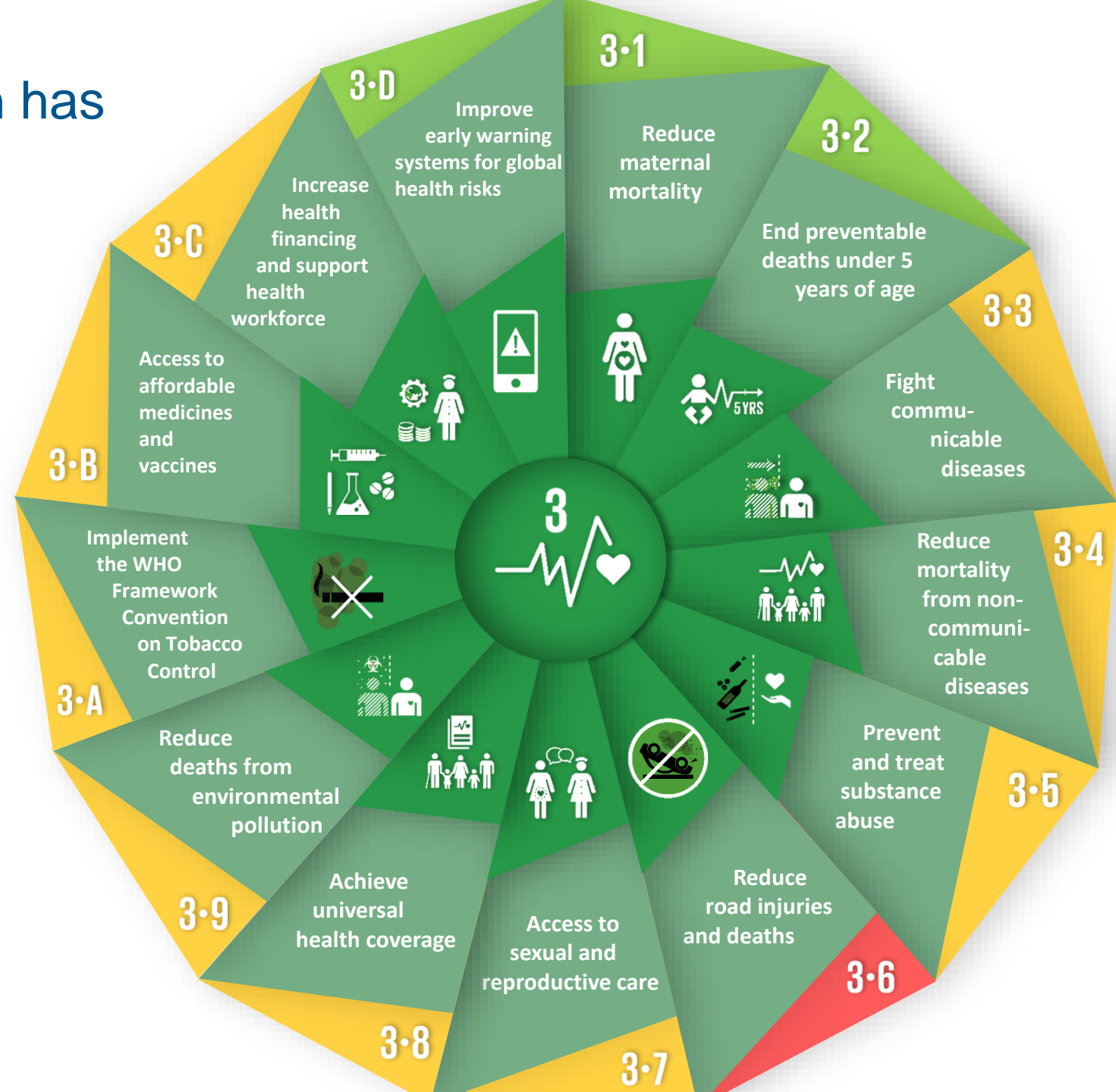

The WHO European Region has made **significant progress** towards better health and well-being.

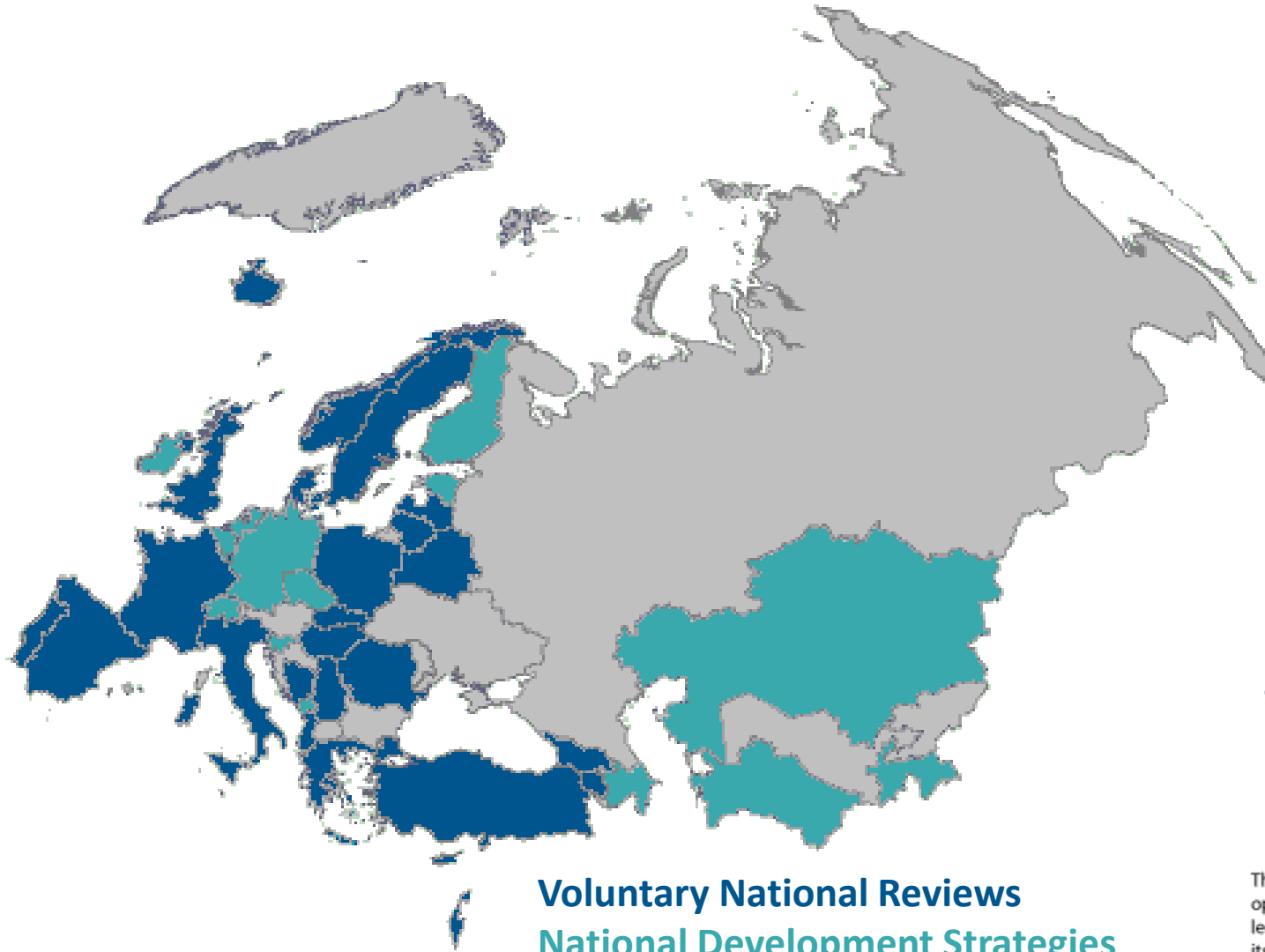
However, **interventions must be scaled up**, otherwise the Region might not reach a number of health targets by 2030.

-  = The Region is on track to reach or has already surpassed this target.
-  = Intensified actions are needed to reach this target by 2030.
-  = The Region is unlikely to meet this target by 2020.

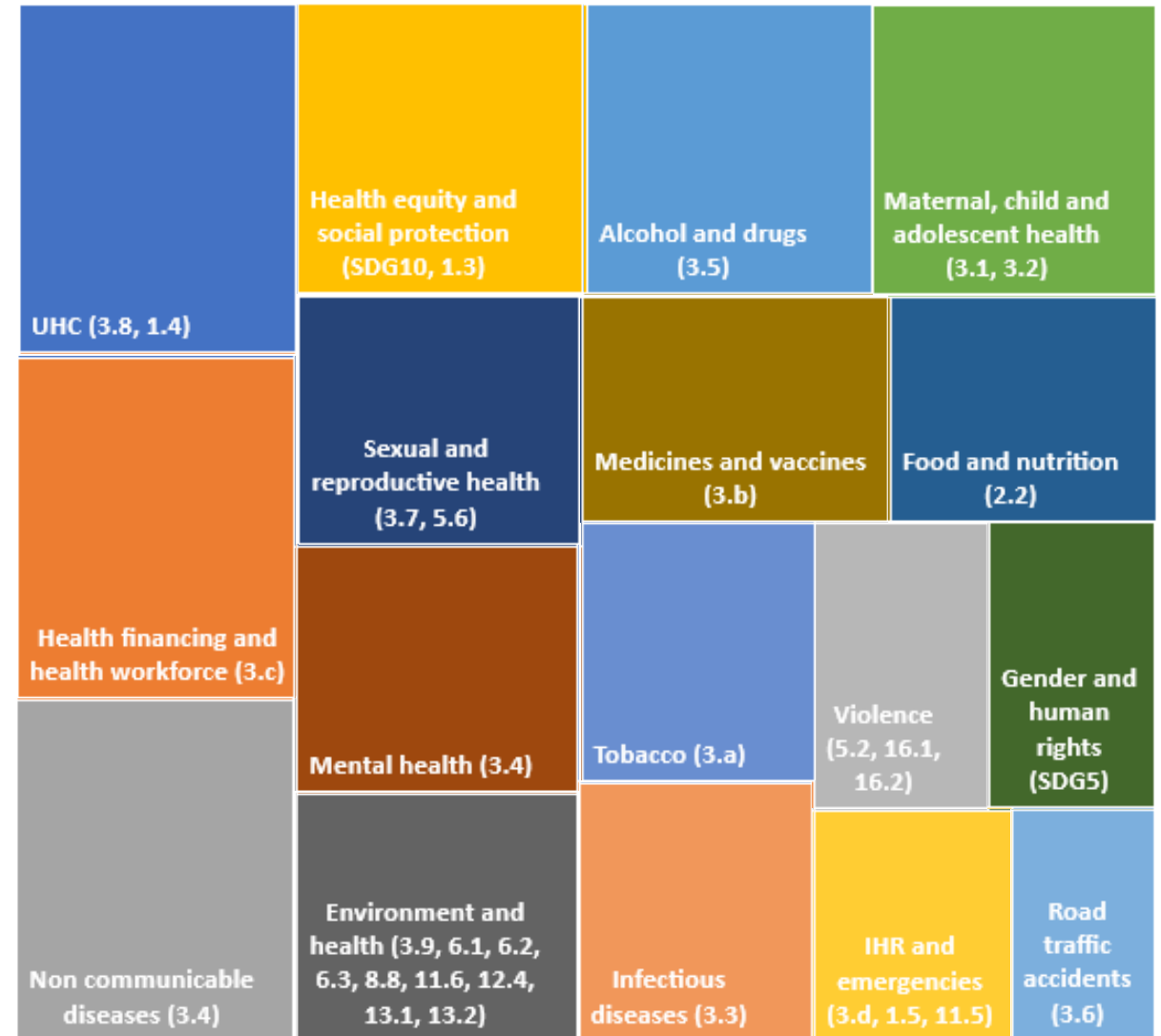

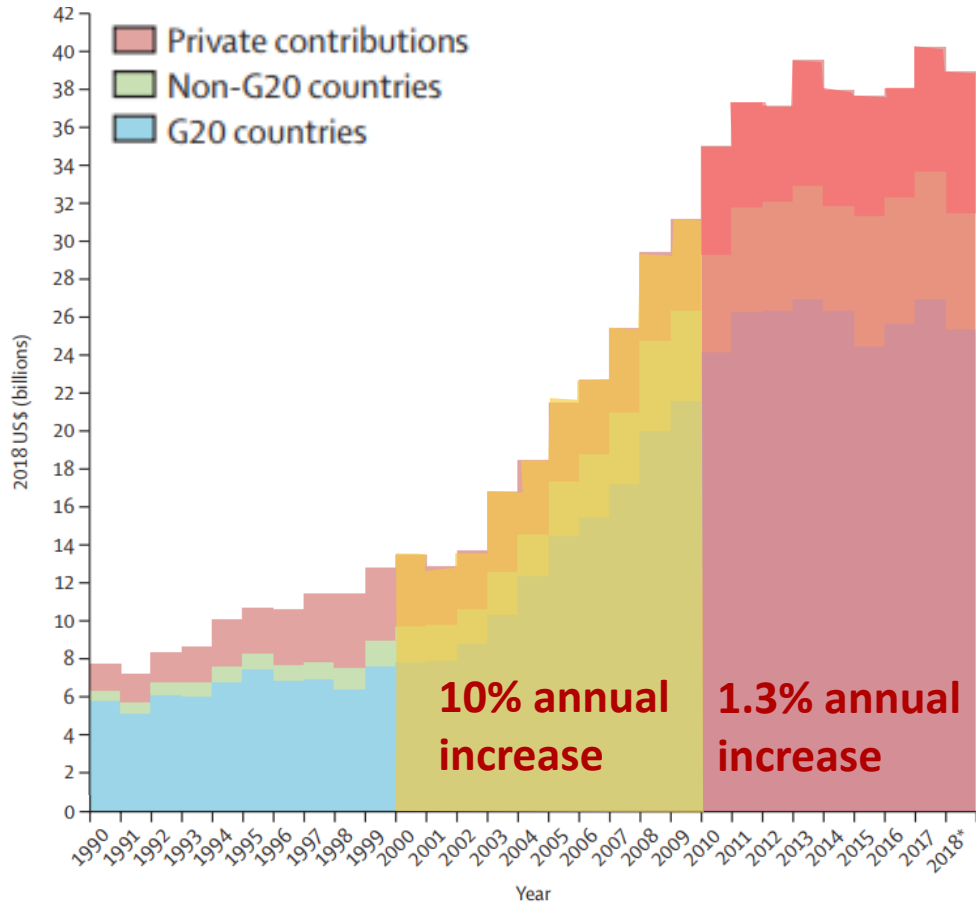

Financing

Development assistance for health by funding group (1990–2018)



Domestic resource mobilization and distribution – SDG financing relies on national budgets.

Financing for sustainable development – rarely integrated into annual budget cycles.

Foreign direct investment – largest source of external finance in some eastern European countries.

Development assistance – has shown little increase in recent years – few European countries benefitting.



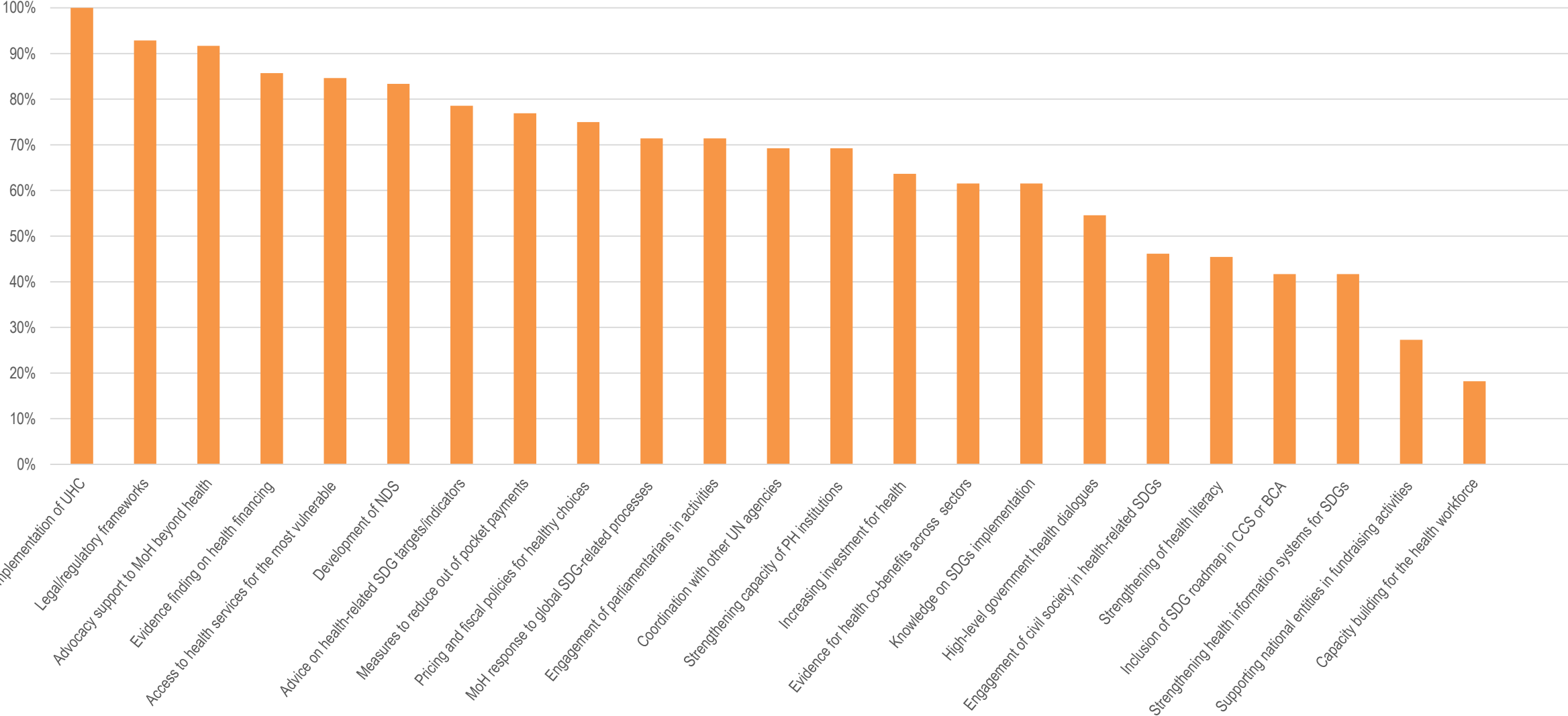
Strengthening health information systems will provide:

- Reduced administrative burden for Member States.
- Fewer discrepancies between different databases.
- More efficient use of resources.

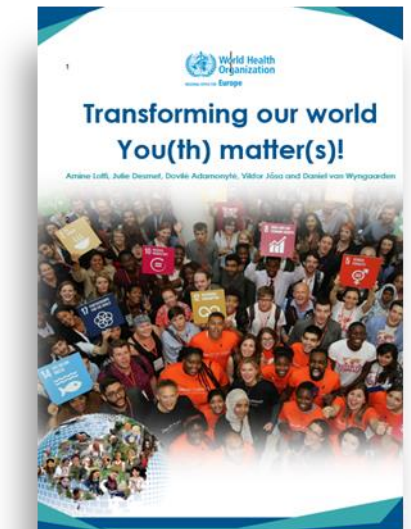
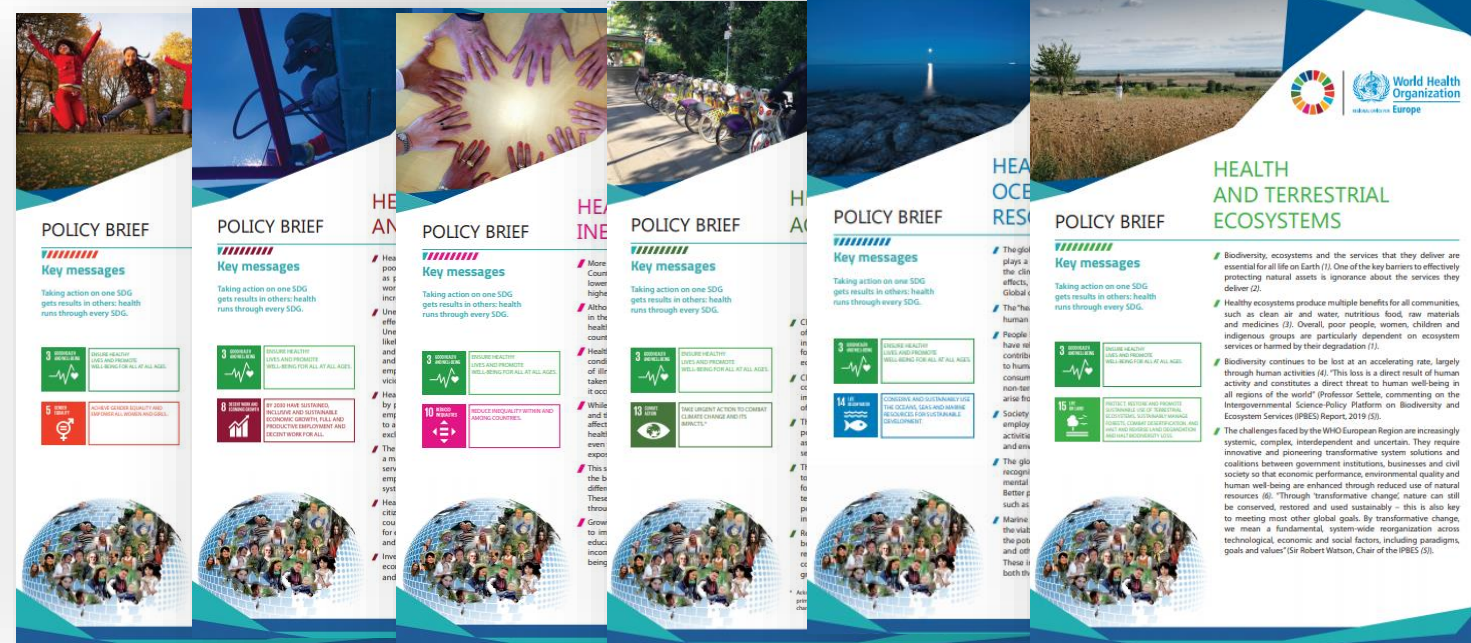
